





Capt Tom at HAWKS CAY RESORT & MARINA reports the waters are almost 80 degrees, with winds a pleasant 5 to 15 knots. Once again its all about Tarpon, Tarpon and Tarpon. Tarpon has invaded the water around Duck Key this week. There have been impressive catches of exceptionally large Tarpon pushing the 200 lb. mark. Capt. Dave Perry on the Eagle Eye is still fishing (2) trips a day, seven days a week. He reports that his morning Tarpon bite has been red hot. The AM tide change is producing catches of 10 to 12 Tarpon a day to 200 lbs. while the PM tide change is only producing 2 to 3 Tarpon to 175 lbs. Most of the Tarpon are being taken under the bridges and in deep channels, using Tarpon candy, (live mullet and crabs). Capt. Scott Meyer from TV's Saltwater Experience said that he is almost exclusively targeting Tarpon

this week. Large numbers of hungry Tarpon to 200 lbs. are eagerly feeding on crabs and mullet. Most of his Tarpon are being taken in the cuts and channels in close proximity to the flats. The Bonefish hunting is really really strong this week. Catches of 8 to 10 bones a day to 10 lbs are common. Brown bonefish jigs dressed with shrimp seem to be doing the trick. The Snook are around but are not cooperating. On Thursday Capt. Scott went to one of his favorite Snook spots and found over 100 Snook stacked up. He started pitching live (pilchards) on their noses with no luck. The only thing they would look at was the C.A.L. (night glow) by D.O.A. The Shark bite is still pretty good with Lemons to 150 lbs, Blacktips to 95 lbs. and bulls to 275 lbs. accounting for most of the action. Sailfish are still bending rods offshore where 5 to 8 sails a day are common. Blackfin Tuna are being trolled up on the Marathon hump. Anglers on a good day are hooking up to 10 fish a day to 25 lbs. Dolphin (Mahi Mahi) has been decent. Most of the fish are schoolies to 15 lbs. with a few gaffers to 25 lbs. and a couple slammers to 40 lbs. The reef fishing has been supplying steady action with 2 to 5 lbs. Yellowtail, Mutton to 14 lbs. Mangrove Snappers to 18 lbs. and plenty of Lane Snappers, Porgies and Grunts. Just to shake things up an occasional 4 ft. barracuda would join the fun.

#### **Ethanol-Blended Fuels**

Ethanol is an oxygenated hydrocarbon compound that has a high octane rating and therefore is useful in increasing the octane level of unleaded gasoline.

Special precautions should be considered with the use of fuel containing ethanol in your system. Fuels with ethanol can attack some fuel-system components, such as tanks and lines, if they are not made from acceptable ethanolcompatible materials. This can lead to operational problems or safety issues such as clogged filters, leaks or engine

Your boat was manufactured, and shipped from the factory, with ethanol-compatible materials. Before introducing gasoline with ethanol into your fuel tank, ask your dealer if any components have been added or replaced that are not recommended by Boston Whaler, Mercury or may not be

It is best to maintain a full tank of fuel when the engine is not in use. This will reduce air flow in and out of the tank due to changes in temperature as well as limiting exposure of the ethanol in the fuel to humidity and condensation.

Phase Separation
Humidity and condensation create water in your fuel tank which can adversly effect the ethanol blended fuel. A condition called phase separation can occur if water is drawn into the fuel beyond the saturation point. The presence of water in the fuel beyond the saturation level will cause most of the ethanol in the fuel to separate from the bulk fuel and drop to the bottom of the tank, significantly reducing the level of ethanol in the fuel mixture in the upper level (phase). If the lower level (phase), consisting of water and ethanol, is deep

enough to reach the fuel inlet it could be pumped directly to the engine(s) and cause significant problems. Engine problems can also result from the reduced ethanol/fue mixture left in the upper phase of the tank

There is no practical additive known that can prevent o correct phase separation. The only solution is to keep water from accumulating in the tank

Mercury already provides the appropriate level of filtration to protect the engine from debris. The addition of another in line filter to the system will create a possible flow restriction that can starve the engine(s) of fuel.

As a precaution, it is advisable to carry extra on-engine filters in case filter plugging from debris in the fuel tank becomes a problem during boating.

#### Maintenance

eriodically inspect for the presence of water in the fuel tank any is found, all water must be removed and the tank empletely dried before refilling the tank with any fue entaining ethanol.

Long periods of storage and/or non-use, common to boats, create unique problems. When preparing to store a boat for extended periods, of two months or more, it is best to completely remove all fuel from the tank. If it is not possi to remove the fuel, maintaining a full tank of fuel with a fuel stabilizer added to provide fuel stability and corrosion

# **Big Pine Key Man Dies** In Boating Accident ...

A resident of Big Pine Key, David Bruce Hunter, 28, was killed Saturday when his boat went airborne and flipped bow-over-stern on Canal 37 in Lake Hatchineha, Polk County.

According to Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) officials, Hunter was operating an 18-foot speedboat and traveling in excess of 80 mph, despite FWC patrols in the area. Hunter lost control of his boat and was ejected into the water when the boat capsized.

Recovery operations continued throughout the weekend. Hunter's body was located late Sunday evening. The Polk County Sheriff's Office dive team and the Osceola County Sheriff's Office water patrol assisted in the recovery operation.

The FWC is continuing the investigation into the accident.



# **Gulf Red Snapper Season** On Hold Until June 1...

The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) reminds anglers that the recreational harvest season for red snapper in Gulf of Mexico waters has changed. The open season now takes place from June 1 through Sept. 30.

Previously, the recreational red snapper harvest season opened on April 15 in Gulf state waters, and the season in Gulf federal waters opened on April 21. Now, the recreational harvest season for red snapper in all Gulf waters off Florida does not open until June 1.

Researchers consider Gulf red snapper to be overfished (in the past) and undergoing more overfishing now. A shorter fishing season will reduce the harvest of Gulf red snapper and help rebuild the fishery's population.





Marathon **International Tarpon Tournament Results and Photos** 







It was a busy week of fishing here in the Lower Keys. The winds were light and lots of people got out on the water for the first time in a while. As the week progressed the full moon slowed the bite in some areas while improving others.

Gulf fishing is in full swing. There are cobia moving from wreck to wreck with a few big schools. There is not much that I like more than seeing a massive school of cobia cruising the surface. Toss a live pinfish out and watch it get slammed. I like to keep a buck tail jig on hand for making a longer toss. When one fish is hooked there will likely be a few followers, so be ready. It is a good idea to head out with a well full of live crabs. The jumbo permit have moved out into the gulf for the annual spawn. Put a live crab out in front of the school and hang on. I like to set up my anchor with a float and a quick release so that we can

pull off and follow the fish. This reduces the fight time and helps keep sharks off the fish.

Offshore fishing started off very good this past week. There were plenty of big dolphin roaming around marked by frigate birds. Trolling ballyhoo with a few pitch bait rods is standard this time of year. By the end of the week the full moon slowed the dolphin bite a good bit leaving a hand full of chicken dolphin in the 500-600 ft depths. As we get away from the moon the dolphin bite should pick back up with more big fish pushing through.

Reef fishing was fair with plenty of yellowtails popping up in the chum slick. The fish were happily eating but so were the sharks. Sharks have been everywhere and in huge numbers and the reef has been no exception. Anywhere that the yellowtail have been showing up has had big numbers of sharks. When you hook a fish, reel as fast as you can in hopes of beating the toothy critters.

Flats fishing is taking off as the water temperatures climb. Big schools of tarpon have been cruising ocean side flats. Give other boats plenty of room when tarpon fishing. If everyone practices a little flats etiquette, then we can all have a good day on the water. When a group of fish passes you do not give chase, rarely will a chased fish eat and all you do is mess things up for the next boat in the line.

Good luck and good fishing.





Were I a mother, all I would want for Mother's Day is great fishing opportunities, and had I been a mother in the Keys this week, I would have gotten my wish. Well, that's what I truly wish for every week, and I really did see just that come to pass.

This weeks report will differ very little from last week's, and those keeping track know that's good news! The fishing is great all over, and so is the weather. It's been sunny and calm all week, leaving no excuse not to go. Dolphin of all sizes are being caught out there in some pretty impressive numbers.

This Saturday was the Habitat for Humanity Mothers Day Dolphin Tournament. Congratulations to Caroline Anthony and the crew of the Main Attraction out of KCB for bringing in the first place fish of 42 pounds. Rounding out the top five were fish all in the mid to upper 30's. Despite the bite right now being typically a bit slower due to the full moon, it's still pretty good. Plenty of nice fish were taken this week in the 300-500 foot depth range, and of course also out in the always productive area between 600 and 700 feet. This week upcoming should

be great, and it looks like the weather will hold for us for at least a few more days.

The snapper bite continues to be excellent, so long as you find some decent current. The usual yellowtail spots in 40-90 foot have been very active with big tails as well as grouper and mutton snapper. Many a fish box have come back this week full of yellow, making for some very happy customers.

The Tarpon has picked up at all three main tarpon fishing locations around Marathon (Long Key Bridge, 7 mile Bridge, and Bahia Honda). Live mullet, crabs, and pinfish are your mainstay baits, but tarpon are also being taken on artificials and even flies. The annual ladies tarpon tournament is wraps up on Sunday the 10th as I write this so you'll have to wait till next issue for the results. But I do know there are plenty of fish being hooked and caught.

Wreck fishing is good now too, with permit, African pompano, amberjack, grouper and snapper all on the target list. Whatever you choose to pursue right now is a good choice, so get it while the gettin is good!



# Judge Allows Ethanol Suit To Move Forward . . .

A District Court judge in southern Florida recently denied a request to dismiss a lawsuit regarding the damage that gasoline blended with ethanol does to boat engines and fuel tanks.

The suit was filed last August by The Kopelowitz Ostrow law firm on behalf of clients Erick Kelesceny, John Egizi and Todd Jessup, all Florida residents. Defendants in the case are Exxon, Chevron, Conoco Phillips, BP and Shell. The suit alleges that the oil companies failed to warn boat owners that ethanol-blended gasoline may destroy fiberglass tanks and tends to absorb water and phase separate, which could cause damage to any boat, regardless of its fuel tank material.

The next step following this week's ruling is pursuing certification to become a class-action lawsuit. If successful, the oil companies will be forced to place a warning label on pumps at all Florida gas stations. The plaintiffs also seek compensation for Florida boat owners whose boats have been damaged by the fuel.

"Denial of the motion is a significant step toward redressing the wrong perpetrated on Florida's boating population," said TKO managing partner Jeffrey Ostrow, in a statement. "Florida is the boating capital of the world, and it is reprehensible for oil companies to enjoy significant profits while knowingly paralyzing Florida's boaters."



# Florida Reports Fewer Boating Deaths ...

The Florida Fish & Wildlife Conservation Commission reports a 30 percent reduction in boating fatalities between 2007 and 2008, with 54 deaths reported in 2008.

"Although boating fatalities were down in 2008, so far in 2009, 21 people have lost their lives on the state's waters," said Lt. Ed Cates of the FWC's boating and waterways section. "Boaters can be safer by following a few simple boating safety tips."

Drowning is the leading cause of boating fatalities, even though most of the victims reportedly knew how to swim.

"The greatest way to ensure that you and your passengers make it home at the end of the day is to get into the habit of wearing a life jacket," Cates said.

# Spearfishing . . .

Make no mistake: Spearfishing can be an act of shark provocation. A speared fish sends out all the right signals—a bloody smell and stress vibrations – that sharks recognize as an "easy meal."


If you are spearing fish, expect shark encounters. What you do next is up to you, but I offer these tips to reduce unwanted interactions and protect the safety of both spearfisher and shark:

- 1. Avoid being in the water alone. Several individuals may be better able to spot and deter an approaching shark.
- 2. Avoid wearing bright or contrasting colors. Sharks have good vision and bright and/or contrasting colors can be stimulating to these curious creatures.
- 3. Be conscious of your surroundings. Unusually high marine life activity (fish, marine mammals, birds) may indicate a concentrated food source like a bait ball that can draw in hunting and stimulated sharks. Conversely, if all the fish in an area immediately disappear, a hunting shark may have just arrived. Check your surroundings and cautiously exit the water.
- 4. Sharks may frequent particular feeding areas, so avoid areas where and when shark encounters have occurred in the past or where sharks have been seen recently.
- 5. Avoid spearfishing in murky water as it may be difficult for you to spot a shark and easier for a shark to mistake you for a potential prey item. Many sharks hunt during dawn and dusk so don't spearfish during these periods.
- 6. If you spot a shark, always maintain direct visual contact with the animal. Do not turn your back and swim away. Sharks generally rely on ambush attack and are aware when they have been spotted. They also may be wary.
- 7. If you spear a fish, immediately remove it from the water.

  Keeping your catch may stimulate a shark approach or attack.

  Avoid areas where people have just been spearfishing.
- 8. If a shark approaches, consider forfeiting your fish before the animal gets within 10 to 15 feet. A discarded catch will likely be consumed by a shark and will not elicit a feeding frenzy; however, failing to let it go could result in a closer than desired encounter brought on by you! Usually sharks will lose interest in you if you are no longer carrying a food source of theirs; however, exit the water immediately, minimizing time at the surface.
- 9. Each shark can have a different personality toward you so, after dropping your fish, if a shark still comes in closer than you are comfortable with then prod them with your speargun. Try to avoid contact with the shark's gills or eyes as this may cause long-term harm. Do not use your speargun as an offensive weapon. Doing so will likely be ineffective and may elicit retaliation. Always maintain direct visual contact with the animal and do not swim away.
- 10. Do not aggravate a shark by trying to harm it or make unnecessary contact. Avoid intruding on a shark's personal space by cornering it between you and a barrier like a beach, a boat or coral. Doing so may cause a shark to become defensive.
- 11. Listen to your inner voice. If you feel uncomfortable in the water, you should exit and return another day.

The ocean is the planet's true last remaining wild place. Despite the tips above, once you enter the ocean you are in the sharks' world and if you spear a fish, you will be provoking them. In the case of an encounter, I urge you to act responsibly and treat these magnificent animals with appreciation and respect.



It's 'Prime Time' here in the Keys. All of our summer species are in place and hungry. From the flats with tons of bonefish, permit and big tarpon, to fishing around the bridges for tarpon & grouper to reef fishing for yellowtail, especially night reef fishing and the most popular of it all right now, dolphin! Everything is in now and if you haven't been able to take advantage of it, I feel for you. (Really!)

This is the time of year when it is flat calm like it has been and your boat is broken down, you tend to stand right next to your mechanic and constantly ask him if there is anything that you can hand him to help speed him up. (As most of us have learned, this just tends to slow them down.) If the boat is in good working order and your fuel funds are not what you would like, you tend to take out a loan just to go. Let me tell you, if that is your case, do it! The fishing right now is worth it!

Let's start in the shallows and work out deeper. The flats fishing is just about as good as it gets with cool enough water temperatures to hold fish up on the flats all day long and calm enough to spot them like the pros. (Far enough away to actually plan your cast to them.) The trick is to have the right gear in your hand for what is coming next. The permit, tarpon and bonefish have been so well mixed that it has been tough to have three different rigs ready. Problems like these are things that are fun to complain about. I talked with one wading fly-fisherman on Ohio Key that saw so many tarpon coming at him at one time, he ran from them! He thought that they were going to run right over him.

The bridge tarpon fishing has picked up dramatically in the past week. The late bite has been the best with more fish seeming to be feeding

after dark. This is not a good time for getting pictures but a great time for action. Earlier in the day, try putting your bait near the bottom for the finicky ones. If nothing else, at least they will have to swim around the bait to get by. Live shrimp has been getting quite a bit of action near the slacking tide as well.

The reef has been alive with yellowtail action, especially at night. The daytime fishing on the reef has been fair with some good grouper action and scattered 'tails but the heat with the light winds has been tough on anglers. The evenings with the dark of the moon have been best in a wide variety of water depths. From 45 to 110 feet, reports have been very good with some real nice sized flags being brought in. I'm not saying that just anywhere is going to be good; you still have to look for the schools on your fish finder. When you find them, they have been aggressive. Cut fresh mullet has been a very good bait tipped on a yellow 'Cy Fly' flat-lined back in the chum. If the current is strong, add a split shot.

Now to talk about the big one, the one arena that over 80% of the anglers that are going out are going for; Dolphin. For those of you that have been here for most of the month, you remember that the first couple of weeks, we could not even get to 300 feet without having several internal organs switching places. Since it has calmed down, so many people have been fishing offshore that the oil companies have had a several office parties. Yes, the fuel docks tell the story. The fish have been very accommodating as well. Some of the largest fish that I have heard of in years are coming through.

Now I do understand fishermen. I know that what a fish is estimated at when it is brought aboard and what it actually weighs when put on a scale are two very different figures. These fish are out there right now and the only thing keeping you from having a shot at them is the fact that you are sitting reading this instead of being out there. (The publisher is going to hate that line.) It is so hot now that it doesn't seem to matter what you drag. I still prefer the artificial baits because I seem to pull the larger fish out of the school and I can cover so much more ground. What I can tell you is to go and you will be rewarded with fresh fish for dinner as well as a great time on the water.



# **Keys' Vandenberg Reef Project Nears Completion...**

The highly anticipated sinking of the world's second-largest ex-military ship to be deployed as an artificial diving and fishing reef is almost here. The Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission (FWC) continues to work with its project partners on final preparations for the ex-U.S.S. Hoyt Vandenberg to be safely sunk in late May at a site about 6 miles south-southeast of Key West in 140 feet of water.

The Vandenberg is 523 feet long and will provide recreational diving, ecotourism and fishing enhancements to the Florida Keys. The colorful vessel was commissioned in 1943 as a World War II troop transport ship, and later it became a missile range instrument ship in the 1960s, defending against missile attacks and tracking rocket and early space shuttle launches.

The ship is being placed in the Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary near Key West to help divert fishing pressure and diving



According to National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration projections, the Vandenberg artificial reef will result in an annual increase of about \$7.5 million in expenditures in the Monroe County economy, and will create about 195 full- and part-time jobs.

"The FWC has played a major role in providing funding and technical assistance for the Vandenberg project since early 2001, including helping the City of Key West secure the necessary permits for the ship and performing numerous inspections of the vessel while it was being readied for its safe deployment," said FWC Chairman Rodney Barreto.

The FWC has been the project liaison among the City of Key West (which owns the ship), Reefmakers, Inc. (the prime contractor for the project), the Florida Keys National Marine Sanctuary, the U.S. Maritime Administration (MARAD), the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

The FWC has managed nearly \$2.5 million in funding for the Vandenberg's preparation, cleanup and monitoring out of total project costs of about \$8.5 million. FWC funding partners include the Governor's Office of Tourism, Trade and Economic Development; MARAD; City of Key West; Monroe County; and Keys Tourist Development Council.

In addition, the FWC's Division of Law Enforcement is taking the lead in working with the Navy, Coast Guard, Key West police and Monroe County Sheriff's office as well as local fire and rescue officers on offshore security operations regarding the sinking event, which is expected to occur sometime between May 21 and June 1, depending on weather conditions.


